







First Tee – Connecticut Changing Lives ... One Golfer at a Time

When First Tee – Connecticut was selected to manage operations at Goodwin Park Golf Course in Hartford during early spring 2022, it opened a whole new world for prospective young golfers. For the first time, many local youngsters now had access to the sport, and it changed the game for the surrounding community.

One of the beneficiaries of this new partnership is Hartford's Covenant Preparatory School. The school's mission includes providing young men from underserved communities the opportunity to thrive in academics and life while becoming leaders and serving the neighborhoods they call home. Covenant Prep jumped at the opportunity to give the gift of golf to its students. The result: Access to a game that would change the lives of the kids interested in pursuing golf.

"Most of our students have never had access to golf, so this was a new experience for them and they fell in love with the sport almost immediately," said Katie McKinney, the school's Director of Development and Community Relations. "Golf is an excellent way to teach our students leadership, patience and strategy in a setting that is safe, fun and focused on community. We are so appreciative of this opportunity that First Tee has provided us."

The relationship between First Tee and Covenant Prep began during a summer golf academy at Avon Old Farms. More than 10 students from the school, including Lincoln Peter, 12, and Jonathan Hall, 11 - participated in the First Tee camp once a week during the summer and became connected to coaches and other volunteers who helped grow their appreciation for golf. Some of the students even decided to continue their golfing during the fall program.

"Golf isn't really something I thought about until I started the First Tee camp. It's a fun sport to play and I am learning a lot," said Jonathan, who also had the opportunity to attend the Travelers Championship in Cromwell last summer. "I've been around golf a lot because my family also likes to play. I really like playing it and I am focused on trying to be more accurate with my shots."

Lincoln said he enjoyed learning from the First Tee team and is excited that Goodwin Park Golf Course is a place where many of his fellow classmates and neighbors can play and learn the sport. He also knows that golf is an activity he can participate in for his entire life.

"I like to play golf and it's a great way to stay healthy," said Lincoln. "I like being outside and enjoying the fresh air and physical activity. My goal is to play golf for a long time since you can play at any age."

Camp Courant is the oldest and largest free summer day camp in the nation, with approximately 800 kids attending each summer.

Our chapter has a long-standing relationship with Camp Courant, supporting the camp each summer offering golf once per week as an activity for the campers, almost all Hartford residents.

Christian Bonvisuto, Wethersfield, Named First Tee National Scholar



In addition to his recognition as part of First Tee – Connecticut Class of 2023, Christian Bonvisuto of Wethersfield was also recognized as one of just 24 members of the First Tee College Scholarship Program.

The First Tee College Scholarship Program aims to support alumni after high school graduation by pairing each Scholar with a trained adult mentor to provide guidance throughout their college careers and beyond. Each Scholar will also participate in professional development workshops and receive up to \$5,000 per year towards tuition and expenses.

The class of 2023 – comprised of 14 young women and 10 young men – was selected from a competitive national pool of First Tee teens. This diverse group of scholars represents 21 First Tee chapters across 18 states. The scholars' future aspirations range from becoming doctors and lawyers to studying economics, biometric engineering, computer science, professional golf management and journalism. Six plan to play collegiate golf.

Participants across First Tee's network submitted applications to be a part of the latest Scholar class. Following an online application process, finalists were selected by a committee for one-on-one interviews. In addition to academic performance, applicants were considered based on financial need, chapter involvement, volunteerism and other criteria.

"Welcome to our new class of Scholars and congratulations on being selected," said First Tee CEO Greg McLaughlin. "The decision to embark on higher education is an important one and I am proud that First Tee can continue to support alumni through the process. Thank you to our partners who support the program and our mentors who provide year-round guidance."

Christian is attending UCONN this fall to further his education. He has been a part of First Tee for almost ten years. He says that through First Tee he was presented with many learning opportunities and appreciates the "invaluable life lessons" he gleaned from those experiences. He was captain of the Wethersfield High School Golf and Tennis Teams and enjoys mentoring younger players. Christian has a passion for helping others through volunteer work; one such activity is coaching the Special Olympics tennis team. He has also participated and won many awards in the PGA Jr. League and in Drive, Chip & Putt competitions.

Hartford HealthCare Women's Championship

The Epson Tour returned to Connecticut in 2023. The event, hosted by Great River Golf Club in Milford, was held in mid-July. As part of our strong partnership with Hartford HealthCare, the title sponsor, First Tee – Connecticut participated in events surrounding the week.

First Tee hosted and conducted a junior clinic with 25 girls from the southern part of the state on Tuesday, July 11. The girls, both experienced and new to golf, enjoyed a fun putting game on the large, sloped putting green at Great River and hit balls with four LPGA pros. The professionals (mostly young women, just out of college) held a clinic on the range, giving the girls tips, talking about their college experiences and now playing golf for a living on the Epson Tour.

In addition, Board Member Bess Barnes played in the Pro-Am with two of our most experienced and accomplished participants---Laniah Moffett and Libby Dunn. This stellar team tied for first place and had a phenomenal experience spending the day with an LPGA pro in competition!



Coaching for the Love of Golf and Life

For Susan Wagemaker, golf is more than just a top three finish or completing a round with a birdie. It's about what players learn in life while on the course: Sportsmanship, integrity and respect for the game and fellow golfers.

As a coach with First Tee – Connecticut over the last 15 years, Wagemaker has enjoyed shaping kids' love for the game and teaching skills they take with them to school, their communities and, eventually, jobs and life.

"I love that golf provides a healthy and competitive outlet for kids and helps them model how to be as people," says Wagemaker. "This is more important than their actual golf skills."

Wagemaker, who can walk to the First Tee facility from her home in Cromwell, has spent her career as an educator, mainly with teenagers. She played a key role in bringing the First Tee golf curriculum to schools in Cheshire. While she still enjoys working with teens, her passion in shaping the love of the game for the younger generation energizes her every day.

"I have had so many "A-ha" moments where I see younger kids, especially girls, start out timid then realize they really can play and get better," said Wagemaker, who noted a time she was coaching and played a game where a group of young girls had to putt the ball and see who could get it as close to a line as possible. They started apprehensively, but that didn't last. "By the end they were giggling and doing cartwheels. It was quite an experience."

Wagemaker plans to continue her engagement with First Tee for the foreseeable future. She knows she – along with all the organization's coaches and volunteers – will continue to make a difference and ensure an affordable, rewarding experience for participants.

"We not only want to teach them about golf, but also life skills," adds Wagemaker. "They are learning lessons that without golf in their lives they may never have learned. That's something we can all be proud of at First Tee."

The 16-year-old road warrior traveled to Philadelphia this past summer to participate in the First Tee Game Changers Academy Honoring Joe Louis Barrow, Jr. and to San Francisco for the First Tee Drive Your Future Academy presented by John Deere, Both trips influenced the

way Sammy sees the world and reinforced her role as a young, female leader.

Changing the Game in Philly

Sammy was one of 72 participants nationwide selected for the Sammy was one of 72 participants nationwide selected for the First Tee Game Changers Academy, a five-day learning and empowerment academy. Participants selected to attend the academy participated in important conversations around issues of identity, racism, diversity, equity and inclusion. First Tee invites its partner, RISE, a national leader in the sports community championing social justice and working to improve race relations, to facilitate engaging and interactive workshops paired with introspective activities and reflections led by nationally trained First Tee coaches.

"It was one of the most amazing experiences ever and I still keep in touch with a lot of the other participants I met," said Sammy, a junior, who added that the combination of golf and learning about diversity, equity and inclusion was unique and inspiring. "These are lifelong relationships and we all learned so much about people's different perspectives on life."

The experience is designed to enlighten, inspire, encourage and position teens to be advocates for justice and social change in their current and future communities. First Tee Game Changers Academy is the ultimate tribute to Joe Louis Barrow, Jr., a fearless champion of change.

A Drive for Change in San Francisco

The First Tee Drive Your Future Academy presented by John Deere is a female empowerment event recognizing young women who are motivated to influence positive impact at their chapters, schools and communities. The five-day academy experience focuses on cultivating meaningful relationships, embracing self-awareness and advocating for oneself and others

The 24 selected teens had the opportunity to participate in activity-based workshops with female industry leaders in technology, STEM and business development. Additionally, teens developed their relationship with mentors on the golf course in a relaxed setting.

"I was able to build so many connections and met incredible young women from across the country," said Sammy, who added that a trip to the Pomeroy Recreation & Rehabilitation Center was the highlight of the trip, along with the amazing golf experience. "We all love First Tee and the energy from everyone that took part in the program was something I will always remember." remember.

For Paige McKenna, **Community Comes First**

For Paige McKenna of Fairfield, the future of her community starts with the younger generation, and she intends to lead the charge. That started with a recent trip to Jacksonville, Florida, to participate in the First Tee Innovators Forum, which equips and empowers First Tee teens to develop a meaningful service project in their communities focused on education, health, human rights, or environmental sustainability.

"First Tee has really taught me how to positively impact my community by engaging with people and helping others," said Paige, who added First Tee allows her to combine her passion for golf and her community. "It's important for me to have an impact on my community. I am excited to attend the Innovators Forum to learn new ideas and meet kids from other parts of the country who have the same values."

While Paige enjoys the individual component of golf, she also believes it's a sport that brings people together. First Tee shows her first-hand how the sport unifies people and communities. "Even though golf is an individual sport, First Tee always brings the community together," said Paige, who has also volunteered with Special Olympics. "It has allowed me to build relationships and I am excited to pursue golf as I get older."

Those selected for the program can learn from industry leaders through interactive workshops and small group breakout sessions. By bringing together passionate participants from across the chapter network, First Tee Innovators Forum provides a distinctive enrichment experience, engaging teens who share a similar desire for learning and generating changes in their

Access to Golf Drives Love for the Game

As a collegiate basketball player, Anthony Bonelli of Rocky Hill never cared much about golf. Then his coach told Bonelli and his teammates they all had to participate in a fall sport to stay focused and in shape for the winter basketball season. While most of the team chose track and field, the golf team at Newberry College in Boston needed bodies to fill out its roster, and Bonelli decided to give it a shot

Bonelli has now been a coach with First Tee – Connecticut for seven years and spreads his love for the game and skill to those in the Waterbury community. It's a city where golf is often not thought of as an option, and Bonelli is changing the game.

"When I was told I had to play a fall sport in college, I began to really focus on golf and loved it," said Bonelli, who is also the Camp Director at First Tee's summer camp. "It's such a great sport for families to connect."

That connection has played an integral role in the growth of golf's popularity in Waterbury, according to Bonelli. He's made it a point to ensure that kids not only have access to the sport in the city, but that they stick with it and refine their skills.

"The kids in Waterbury really love golf and they are telling their friends to play. Some have even begun to assist me with lessons," said Bonelli. "There's no better feeling than seeing the excitement and progress of these golfers. That's the reason I spend so much time with First Tee. It's inspiring."

The summer and fall sessions of First Tee Group Lessons run seven weeks and provide weekly access to golf for participants. Bonelli not only wants to ensure kids have access to golf clubs and courses – many of which are city-owned – but also to create a lifelong passion.

"The feedback we get from our golfers is always positive," adds Bonelli. "When we have families outside enjoying the sport together, we know we have succeeded in our mission."

David M. Ladd 1943 - 2023

David Michael Ladd died peacefully at home on June 14, 2023, following a brief illness. David is the son of William E. Ladd and Ruth Purdy Ladd. David is survived by his best friend, his wife of 56 years, Billie Hankins Ladd and his brother-in-law, Skip Conn. After a brief career as a bank officer, in 1975 David founded an investment advisory firm in New Haven, Ladd Capital Management, where David was the managing partner for 48 years.

David's passion in life was golf. He loved watching golf, talking about golf, reading about golf and mostly playing golf. That passion led to David's involvement with First Tee – Connecticut where he began serving as a volunteer golf coach and mentor at Alling Memorial Golf Course in New Haven. He then proudly served as an active member of the chapter's Board of Directors for 16 years. Until the time of his passing, David was a member of First Tee – Connecticut's Emeritus Board, recognizing his exemplary service to the organization and its mission and goals.

CEO, Mark Moriarty said, "David will be sorely missed; he was always so passionate about First Tee, and he was incredibly supportive of our efforts in New Haven and beyond over the years."
